## CANBERRA'S OWN GLOBAL SISTERS PART OF ONLY AUSTRALIAN FINALIST IN INTERNATIONAL FUNDING COMPETITION

A group of refugee and migrant women in Canberra are part of an organisation that's just been announced as the only Australian finalist in the international *Project Inspire* funding program.

Canberra has quickly emerged as the national focal point of <u>Global Sisters</u>, a new online platform that's helping excluded women to earn an income and find security through their own business.

Now it's one of only 10 finalists hand-picked from over 500 entries received from 70 different countries (it's understood around 20 entries were received from the Australia-Oceania region).

<u>Project Inspire: 5 Minutes to Change the World</u> is a joint initiative from the Singapore Committee for UN Women and MasterCard, with a \$25,000 grant on offer to the successful applicant.

Global Sisters founder Mandy Richards is a passionate entrepreneur of some 20 years experience who is well-known locally as the inaugural manager of the highly successful ACT Social Enterprise Hub.

Ms Richards said the concept behind Global Sisters is to create an 'online village' and a safe, supportive space for women starting out in business.

"The women we are supporting are financially excluded and marginalised due to a number of complex barriers including culture, language, mental illness and generational unemployment," said Ms Richards.

"We work on three levels: by offering a free business directory for social enterprise and small businesses, an e-marketplace where setting up an online shop is quick, easy and free; and a microfinance program that includes initial business loans of up to \$1000," she said.

"Our mission is 'financial independence for female entrepreneurs' and we really are an Australian first, in that we offer a complete end-to-end model that helps a woman overcome the many – otherwise unaddressed – barriers she might encounter in moving away from welfare reliance and establishing a sustainable business."

So far, a long list of local photographers, writers, designers and 'wise women' business advisors have signed on to provide pro-bono services, offer advice, and use their knowledge and experiences to connect with women in need.

Included among them are Canberra's own digital storyteller <u>Jennifer Thompson</u>, designer <u>Samorn Sanixay</u>, former ACT MLA <u>Amanda Bresnan</u>, photographer and restaurateur <u>Lorna Sim</u>, and communications practitioner <u>Jane Speechley</u>.

In addition, over 600 'sisters' and organisations are being supported by Global Sisters already, including: <u>Jennifer Lowe</u> from Burma, <u>Pakao Sorn</u>, also from Burma, and <u>Tamara Kadhim</u>, originally from Iraq - all of whom are now call Canberra home.

Ms Richards said the *Project Inspire* funds would provide a huge boost to Global Sisters' work in Canberra and around the country.

"If our submission to partner with UN Women is ultimately successful, the grant would allow us to launch a micro-finance demonstration project supporting refugee and migrant women in Australia," said Ms Richards.

"The opportunity means we will be able to provide micro-loans and integrated business advisory, marketing support and access to an online sales platform for a minimum of 20 women.

"Once the project has concluded, we'll evaluate and document the model so it's ready to be called-up for use in other parts of Australia and overseas," she said.

Global Sisters' Hawanatu Bangura, 25, will now travel to Singapore to participate in a week-long social business bootcamp, and to represent the organisation in the *Project Inspire* Grand Final live pitch on 30 August.
