GRANT COMMITMENTS FOR 2014

I am delighted to present a brief overview of the 70 grants The Snow Foundation has provided to date for 2014. This amounts to over \$1.2 million in grants to 48 community organisations and 22 individuals.

We maintain our funding to 28 existing programs, spanning across our three key areas of focus. These include organisations in health & disability, such as Friends of the Brain Injured providing therapy for children with cerebral palsy; social welfare, for example Karinya House which offers a warm home for new mothers; and education and employment, through Queanbeyan High School's scholarship program and The Smith Family's Learning for Life program.

We welcome supporting a further 20 diverse programs. For example, local organisations such as Cerebral Palsy ACT for the purchase of equipment for their new centre; Dad's Place, a weekend home for homeless fathers to enjoy with their children, and YWCA with their new creative Computer Clubhouse, an out of school learning space for marginalised youth in the Tuggeranong area, officially launching in October.

We are also pleased to bring to Canberra the successful juvenile justice mentoring program with SHINE for Kids for young residents at Bimberi Youth Justice Centre. We hope this has the same significant positive impact on imprisoned youth as it has in NSW.

Whilst our main geographical area continues to remain in the Canberra region, our reach extends to rural localities with increased funding for the provision of scholarships for country students via the Royal Agricultural Society Foundation and the Country Education Foundation of Australia.

In addition, we purchased much needed educational resources to assist disadvantaged students at St Therese's Community School at Wilcannia.

More broadly, it has been wonderful to provide the initial catalytic funding to two innovative national programs:

- Good360, a community organisation that matches excess products (clothing, computers, bedding) from corporates to charities rather than going to land-fill, providing a social and environmental solution.
- The Big Issue Homes for Homes project, a scalable social enterprise that will generate much needed new funds to increase the supply of affordable social housing across Australia.

Reflecting on the year, we are delighted to see the progress of two important, but very different initiatives. One Disease at a Time is expanding their successful scabies elimination program across more indigenous communities in the Northern Territory. The building of Common Ground Canberra is progressing well with doors expected to be open by the end of the year, providing a real solution to homelessness.

On behalf of our directors, I would like to thank all the people involved in working on these programs, for their dedication, passion and persistence.
